Hello LSC,

Our lives have transformed over the past weeks to accommodate and respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. While we haven't hosted any learning circles in the past 6 weeks, we have been staying in touch with PC CARES facilitators throughout this adjustment period.

The pandemic is undoubtedly widening gaps where there is existing inequity: in education, income, health concerns, etc. It's important that while we stay physically distant, we also promote community connectedness any way we can. Suicide remains an urgent problem with lasting impact in our communities, and we are working to find creative routes to our project objectives. While the form or format of PC CARES may need to adapt, the information remains relevant. Asking ourselves "What do we know?" about suicide prevention and wellness, "what do we think?" and "what do we want to do?" can still build communities of practice—even if we can't be in the same room, or are standing 6 feet apart.
